Academy of Ancient Music is an orchestra with a worldwide reputation for excellence in baroque and classical music. Using historically-informed techniques, period-specific instruments and original sources, we bring music vividly to life in committed, vibrant performances.



Established 50 years ago to make the first British recordings of orchestral works using original instruments, AAM has released more than 300 albums to date, collecting countless accolades including Classic BRIT, Gramophone and Edison awards. We now record on our own-label AAM Records, and are proud to be the most listened-to period-instrument orchestra online, with over one million monthly listeners on streaming services.

Beyond the concert hall, we engage the next generation of period-instrumentalists with side-by-side sessions, masterclasses and other opportunities designed to bridge the gap from the conservatoire to the profession, safeguarding the future of historical performance.

AAM is Associate Ensemble at the Barbican Centre, London and the Teatro San Cassiano, Venice, and Orchestra-in-Residence at the University of Cambridge, Milton Abbey International Summer Music Festival and The Apex, Bury St Edmunds.


The association of anniversaries with precious metals can be traced back to the Middle Ages, and since that time the gold associated with 50th anniversaries has had dual symbolism. As a thing mined from the earth, gold reflects a wealth of shared experience over time. But being refined from ore, it also looks optimistically forward, with the possibility of ever perfected form and purpose.

What better lens through which to view our 2023–24 50th anniversary season? Across the year, we celebrate cherished triumphs past – beloved works by Handel, Vivaldi, JS Bach and Henry Purcell amongst others – while continuing to blaze a trail for historical performance, championing forgotten female composers at the court of Empress Maria Theresa, restoring noted abolitionist and freed slave Ignatius Sancho to the musical panoply of mid-18th century London society, and commissioning new works for historical instruments for the first time since the early 2000s.

But leave aside the 'how'. The 'what' of *The Golden Anniversary* is celebration, something to be experienced in communion with others: to be shared. I hope that you will join us across the season to share in all AAM has been for the past fifty years, and – perhaps more importantly – to celebrate all we will be for many more years to come.

# from Laurence Cummings

Music Director

It's my great pleasure to welcome you to Academy of Ancient Music's 2023–24 season, our fiftieth: *The Golden Anniversary*.

Since 17 September 1973, AAM has been at the forefront of historically-informed performance. Baroque and classical music had come to function somewhat as an amusebouche to enjoy before listening to the 'serious music' of the 19th century. Christopher Hogwood founded AAM to strip away the layers of 19th- and 20th-century performing practices and reveal the rhetorical eloquence of this now well established and beloved repertoire. In this spirit of trailblazing and adventure we begin our season with a programme of music by two remarkable 18th-century women – Maria Teresa Agnesi and Marianna Martinez – sung by rising-star soprano Alexandra Lowe. *Music for an* Empress, a colourful exploration of music-making at the court of the Empress Maria Theresa, sets the tone for the rest of the series, which challenges preconceived notions even when presenting well-loved works.

Whether that's performing JS Bach's *Brandenburg Concertos* with single strings and at low pitch to help bring out the solo characters at play, contextualising Vivaldi and Corelli's celebrated *concerti* with lesser-known works by Mossi and Valentini, or live French baroque dancing, you can expect the unexpected all season long.

But above all, AAM will continue to deliver accessible music-making of the very highest quality with guests and principal artists of international renown to you, our audience. I hope that you will join us, and I look forward to welcoming you all soon!


Academy of Ancient Music travels to the Vienna of Empress Maria Theresa – where genius paid court, and music flourished in magnificent (and unexpected) new ways.

They called her the 'mother-in-law of Europe', but as monarch, war-leader, diplomat and patron of the arts, the Empress Maria Theresa of Austria was one of the most extraordinary rulers in European history. Tonight, Academy of Ancient Music pays homage: recreating an era of splendour, innovation and music without limits.

Some of the names need no introduction – and Gluck, Haydn and the young Mozart were just some of the stars who shone around Maria Theresa's throne. But just as the Empress herself defied convention, so Academy of Ancient Music will explore some more neglected names too: Maria Teresa Agnesi and Marianna Martinez are composers of striking originality and inspiration who flourished during the reign of a truly exceptional woman.

# All six of Bach's Brandenburg Concertos in one gloriously life-affirming concert from Laurence Cummings and Academy of Ancient Music.

In 1721, Johann Sebastian Bach dedicated six concerti grossi to the Margrave of Brandenburg – six controlled explosions of fantasy, melody and exuberant joy, glowing with all the colours of the baroque orchestra at its most unbuttoned. Hearing all the Brandenburg Concertos in one concert is a feast for the ear and refreshment for the spirit.

And that's exactly what Academy of Ancient Music is offering tonight, as AAM Music Director Laurence Cummings plays as first among equals in music that never grows old. When performed with the period instruments and historically-informed playing techniques of AAM, Bach's inspiration and vitality simply sings through: more vivid, more entertaining and more original than ever. This should be a treat.

Academy of Ancient Music Bojan Čičić director & violin


AAM leader Bojan Čičić takes us on a return trip to baroque Italy, in this celebration of the Italian concerto in all its wildly entertaining forms – from Vivaldi's Venice to the splendour of Rome.

Take the warmth of Italy. Add the energy of the baroque, plus the novelty and glamour of the very latest in musical technology: the violin. Today we celebrate the Italian concerto, a sunburst of creativity, flamboyance and sheer musical imagination that took Europe by storm – and transformed the way we listen.

Tonight, we'll meet some old friends: who doesn't love the showmanship and melody of Vivaldi's L'Estro Armonico, or the unchained exuberance of a Corelli Concerto Grosso? Locatelli, Valentini and Mossi are less well-known, but every bit as entertaining. AAM's leader Bojan Čičić leads a hand-picked team of virtuoso players to rediscover a fabulous lost world: music that never loses its power to seduce, dazzle and delight.


The Sun King dances: Academy of Ancient Music and baroque dance experts Mary Collins and Steve Player recreate the sounds and sights of the court of Louis XIV of France.

Versailles, 1700: where all arts revolved in brilliantly choreographed splendour around the monarch they called The Sun King. Historical dance experts Mary Collins and Steve Player join Academy of Ancient Music to pay homage to Louis XIV of France, a king for whom music and political power were all part of the same resplendent dance.

So expect to hear from the greatest composers of the age – the exotic spectacles of Lully and Campra, the stately elegance of Rebel and Delalande, and the eloquent poetry and courtly wit of Marais and Elisabeth Jacquet de la Guerre. And watch it spring to life, too, as the specialists use all their expertise and artistry to recreate the art of dance at the glittering pinnacle of the French baroque.

Programme to include works by Henry Purcell, Samuel Pepys, GF Handel, MC Festing and Ignatius Sancho, and a new work by Roderick Williams

Countertenor Reginald Mobley and AAM explore a different vision of the English baroque: in which the music of Purcell, Handel and Ignatius Sancho redefined the culture of a nation.

Baroque England was a nation turned inside out: a fledgling democracy that could also be profoundly unjust, a culture convinced of its own uniqueness but which welcomed genius from all lands. Tonight, Academy of Ancient Music explores an era that's never felt more current.

So, the music of the London-born Purcell sits alongside masterpieces by Handel – a German who became English by choice – and Ignatius Sancho, who was born into slavery but found freedom and musical success in Georgian England. Curated by American countertenor Reginald Mobley, *Sons of England* weaves music and words to explore alternative histories of the English baroque, culminating in a Sancho-inspired new commission by composer Roderick Williams: musical history shaping a shared future.
